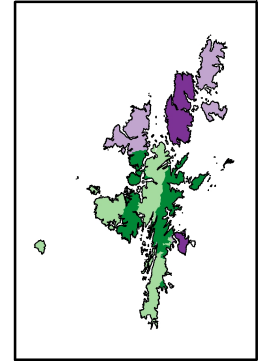
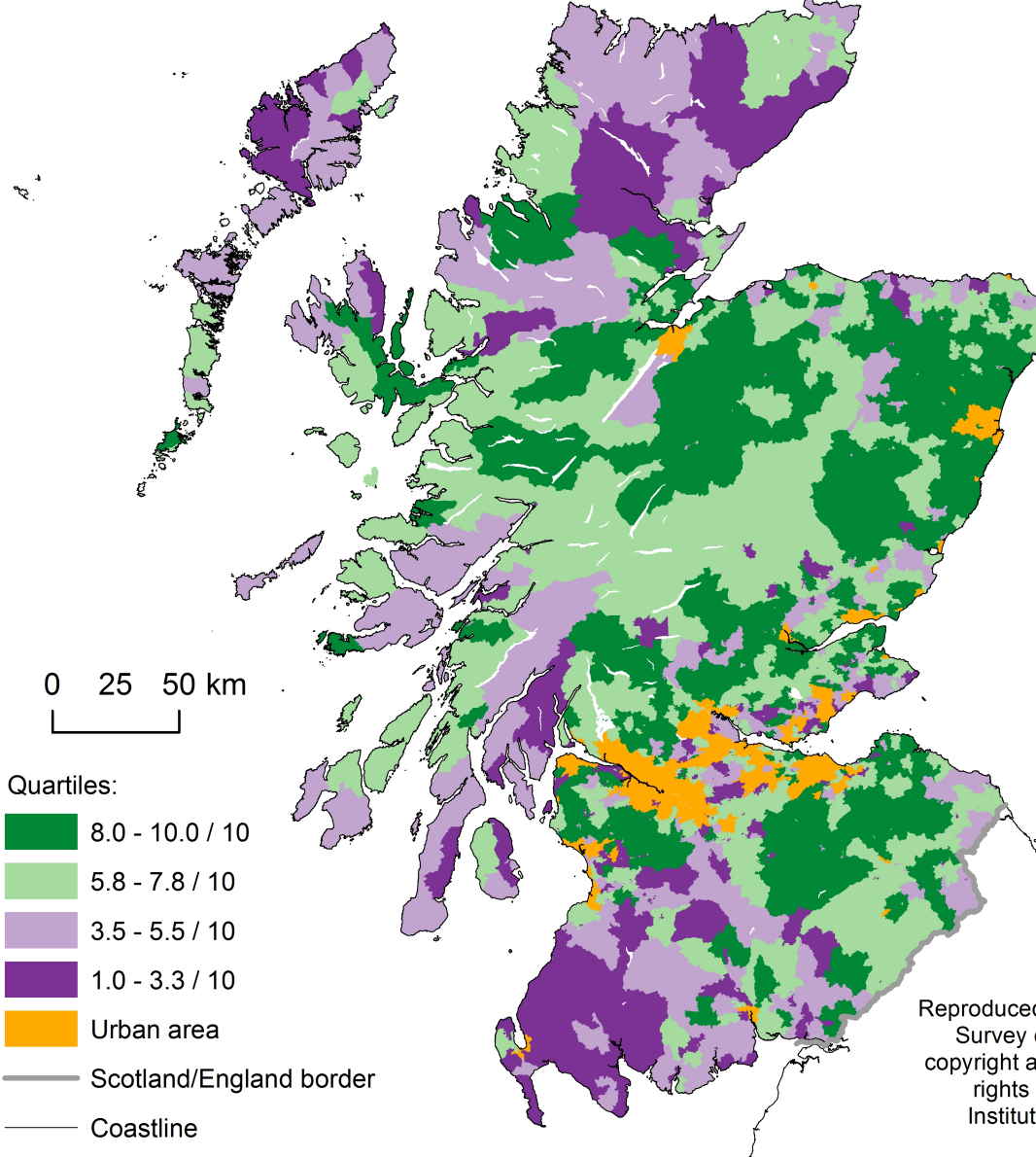


Strategic Objective score: Healthier (2011)

Data shown: quartiles for data zones in rural areas and small towns. Scores have a theoretical range from 1-10, with higher values showing better performance.



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Data shown: mean scores, +/- 1 standard deviation, dotted line shows mean score (all data zones in analysis)

Summary: Accessible rural areas were healthiest, on average. Many data zones to the south of Glasgow and Edinburgh, near Aberdeen and Inverness, and in the Northern Isles mainlands, performed strongly. More peripheral areas tended to have lower 'healthier' scores.
