Introduction

The Macaulay Land Use Research Institute (www.macaulay.ac.uk) in Aberdeen has been commissioned by the Scottish Government to do research that will improve flood risk planning and responses to flood warnings. Our work here in Huntly is part of a larger European research project called 'URFlood' aimed at providing guidance on good practice in flood communications. (We will also be sending this questionnaire to some people who were flooded in Glasgow.)

The aim of this questionnaire is to find out and characterise where and how warnings about floods are received and used. This questionnaire is not just for people who have been flooded: we are interested in everybody's views. It should take about about 10 minutes to fill in, or longer if you wish to provide us with comments.

When filling out the questionnaire, please add any comments you have to the document. You can also discuss any issues when one of our staff comes to collect the questionnaire.

We intend to collect the questionnaires in person on the _____ of July. Alternatively, if we miss you then, we will leave a stamped address envelope with you, so that you can post it back to us at the Macaulay Institute.


